

aving fallen for the charms of an elegant Georgian property in one of Edinburgh's most sought-after streets, Talei Stewart realised that she had just stumbled across her next home. 'Although I was absolutely captivated by the historic townhouse, the prospect of moving 10,000 miles across the globe, to a property that was such a contrast to my contemporary beach house in Australia, seemed a little daunting,' says Talei. However, having met interior designer Kimberley Bremner of Edinburgh-based Jeffreys Interiors, Talei knew that the whole process would be plain sailing.

In 2019, keen to relocate to the UK, Talei had arranged a whistle-stop trip to Edinburgh with her family, before heading to the Scottish Highlands for Hogmanay celebrations. 'What was meant to be an overnight stay turned into something very different,' she says. 'The people in Edinburgh were so friendly and I felt such an instant connection with this amazing city that it became a hot contender as somewhere to live.'

Strolling through Stockbridge, a vibrant area to the north of the city centre, Talei was enchanted by the cobbled streets, ornate period street lights, neatly kept front gardens and array of handsome homes. 'This particuloar street was one of the prettiest I'd ever seen and, when I spotted a for sale sign, I couldn't believe it,' she says. Having swiftly arranged a viewing, Talei decided to make an offer on the house. 'Australia is all about bright, open-plan living, but I just loved the cosiness of this house and moodiness of the light,' she explains. 'It

was in need of updating but it had some beautiful period features and just felt right. When you know, you know!'

Talei was drawn to Jeffreys Interiors when she saw its website and, having visited the company's showroom, was delighted to cross paths with Kimberley. 'Right from the outset, I had a very clear idea about the interiors. I wanted to feel cocooned in a relaxing home, surrounded by my books and artwork,' Talei explains. 'Since Kimberley shares my love of dark, atmospheric interiors and totally understood my design brief, I trusted her to take the lead in this long-distance process.'

When the sale completed in June, taking on board Kimberley's suggestions to rejig the layout, work began. 'I recommended moving the sitting room to the ground floor and repurposing the space to create a special main bedroom suite,' Kimberley says. Downstairs, in what was a split-level kitchen, Kimberly advised levelling the floor and commissioned Edinburgh-based Peden & Pringle to design a bespoke kitchen.

Taking inspiration from Talei's art, pieces collected during travels with her family, and her desire for warm, textured layering, Kimberley painstakingly researched, created and photographed mood boards for each room, before sending the images and samples to Australia.'I wanted each room to be tied together but also have its own identity,' Kimberley explains. 'The main linking features were the palette of blues, greens and mustards.'

The result is a home that Talei adores. 'Kimberley's work completely exceeded my expectations,' says Talei. 'This is a beautiful home that's truly magical.'
